While Continuum has industry-leading security controls for e-mail, occasionally an unsolicited commercial or suspicious message ("Spam") makes its way into the **chpnet.org** system. That happened recently when an e-mail—supposedly from the "Helpdesk," with a subject line, "Message From Administrator"—reached a few members of Continuum's e-mail community. It asked them to click on a link that led to an external, malicious website.

Information Technology wants to remind all e-mail users to be reasonably cautious of e-mails from sources they do not know or recognize, especially those seeking to coerce personal or financial information. If you receive a suspicious or questionable e-mail, delete it. Take no further action and do not send any kind of reply. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

It's also important to note that members of the Continuum Health Partners community are prohibited from asking colleagues for their computer passwords, social security numbers or any other sensitive information via an e-mail communication. If you receive e-mails like this, please delete them.
